Welcome to the first newsletter of 2023 as we look back and reflect on events across December 2022. I hope everyone had a peaceful and relaxing winter break, especially our S4-6 pupils as 2023 will be a very important year for them with assessments in January for S4 and in February for S5/6 in preparation for the SQA examination diet in May.

The month of December is usually characterised by attendance at various concerts and school dances. Happily, this was the case in December 2022. The East Dunbartonshire Christmas concert took place on Monday 5 December in the Glasgow Concert Hall and was once again a lovely way to start the Christmas season. Our school was very well represented with 14 pupils playing in the concert. They all did very well indeed.

From my perspective as head teacher of Lenzie Academy, whilst I really enjoy the EDC Christmas Concert, I can't deny that I take more pride in the performance of our own pupils who participate in the Lenzie Academy Christmas Concert, which took place on Monday 12 December. This year the concert took place in Lenzie Parish Church and was a triumph. Further details are outlined within this newsletter.

On 13 December we had nearly 200 S1/2 pupils enjoy putting the ceilidh skills learnt in PE to good practice at their Christmas Dance and a great evening was had by all who attended. Similarly about 200 of our S5/6 enjoyed their dance on Tuesday 20 December. Staff turnout for both events was very high and everyone enjoyed the dances. Unfortunately we had very poor ticket sales for our S3/4 dance and had to cancel the event, which was very disappointing. In PE the pupils engaged well with social dancing but hardly any purchased a ticket for the event. We will seek to find out the reason(s) for this as this is a very rare event and indeed the first cancellation of a dance in more than 12 years.

In December we had a visitation from East Dunbartonshire Council for their annual attainment review. This was a very positive and constructive meeting and I am pleased to report that our attainment profile remains very strong. EDC have changed the focus of their annual visit and the school has no concerns with the slight change of focus.

In schools our primary purpose is to provide first class learning and teaching leading to strong academic attainment for all our pupils. If this was the only focus for schools young peoples' experiences would be quite a sterile one. As a school we have a wide array of extra-curricular activities and clubs across every day of the week and we have engaged in various school visits to support the curriculum as well as getting numerous guest speakers to come in and share their experiences with our pupils. This allied to a wealth of planned trips across the UK and beyond our shores enhances and enriches our young peoples' experiences. We also make it a key element in the formation of the development of a young person's character to get actively involved in helping others. Maxwell Cay

Many of you may already be aware but on 10 December one of our S5 pupils, Maxwell Cay, passed away after a prolonged spell in hospital. Maxwell was a very bright and adventurous pupil who achieved very well in his S4 examinations and would have done likewise in his S5 examinations. Maxwell's funeral was attended by myself, Maxwell's guidance teacher Mr Curran, his year head Miss Munro, Mrs Clyne DHT for S2 as well as other staff and our school captains. It was heartening to see so many of Maxwell's friends and peers from school also attend the funeral service led by Rev Carmichael. The focus of the service was on how Maxwell lived a very full life and was keen to take on new and various challenges.

Some of Maxwell's friends held a guard of honour for him as his family left the church and I know that Maxwell's family were touched by both the huge turnout at his funeral and the guard of honour held by his close friends.

As a school we will be consulting with Maxwell's friends and family about how we commemorate his life as a pupil with us. Every year it is always very interesting to see what courses and career paths are being pursued by our pupils.

It is encouraging that our pupils are entering such a wide and varied array of courses. Many have already had unconditional offers and we hope their motivation to succeed remains regardless of this. Many have conditionals and this in and of itself will act as motivation for them to work hard to gain entry to their preferred course at their preferred university.

Each group researched different charities to donate to, we presented this to the rest of the class and we had a class vote. The charity we chose was: Pathfinder Dogs. This is a charity which raises and trains German Shepherds as guides to blind people in the UK. The pupils from both classes worked very hard to produce a variety of different Christmas themed products such as Christmas mugs, baubles,



Grinch sweet cones and reindeer hot chocolate. The classes were also responsible for designing promotional materials and decorations to ensure the event was well attended.

In the weeks leading up to the event the pupils from both classes worked hard in their teams in order to get all the products ready on time. They made excellent use of their ICT skills and demonstrated a great deal of initiative. The event was a hugely popular with staff and pupils. In total £280 was raised for Pathfinder Dogs. New initiatives/information

We continue to work on additional ways in which we can offer supports to pupils. Our school canteen will now offer a daily breakfast service which will be open to all pupils and staff. Pupils can purchase cereal, toast and juice. This is a safe, warm, comfortable space where pupils and staff can gather in the morning and purchase something to eat.

Within the school, we now have the facility to refer families in need of food support to EDC Foodbanks. EDC Foodbanks have facilities across East Dunbartonshire and provide families with food and household items, including fresh fruit and vegetables when available. If you are in need of any food support, please contact your child's Guidance Teacher in the first instance in order to start the referral process.

Information has been issued to all pupils in PSE and at assemblies regarding the Free Bus Travel Pass provided by the Scottish Government for all young people under age 22. We are encouraging all pupils to apply for this pass as it allows them to travel on all public transport buses in Scotland free of charge. For those under the age of 16, parents/guardians must apply for this pass, those over the age of 16 can apply themselves. Any pupil over the age of 16 should speak to their Guidance Teacher or Miss Provan if they need any support completing this application.
