Tate Conflict Leads to Imprisonment

Earlier last week, Former Kickboxing champion and Part time businessmen, Andrew Tate and his younger brother Tristan, were seized and taken into custody by the Romanian authorities on the 29th of December 2022. They, along with two unidentified females, have recently been charged with the crime of human trafficking and the creation of an organized crime group. In recent weeks, Tate has additionally been under suspicion for the production of illegal pornography, and this latest arrest is related to these claims.

From his birth in the 1980s, the 36-year-old has formulated many social media accounts, where he has attracted an extravagantly substantial number of fans and viewers. His strange and frequently offensive approach to entertainment has caused widely spread suspicion among local authorities and public citizens. Using racism and sexism to gain recognition is strictly band on common social media platforms

such as TikTok, YouTube and Twitter, and actions have been taken to revoke Tate of his multiple accounts.

Tate's strictly "Masculine" online agenda has caused a lot of disruption among the online public due to offensive slurs traced back to Tate and his online nickname, 'Top G.' His latest arrest has caused authorities to explore recent behaviour and investigate whether more serious penalties should be imposed.

For now though, Tate and his three alleged partners in crime, will only be forced to remain at the detention centre for 30 days after losing an appeal with Romania's crime fighting organization DIICOT. With links to rape allegations, abuse and trafficking, many are anxiously awaiting the outcome of these investigations.



Prior to being reinstated to Twitter by new owner Elon Musk, Tate had very little contact with his social life due to inappropriate usage, and has taken this recent opportunity to recreate the spotlight he obtained not so long ago.

After reconnecting with his Twitter

account, Tate attempted to start a feud with 20-year-old climate activist Greta Thunberg. During this conflict, Tate posted his assortment of unnecessary supercars and the shocking level of emissions they annually produce, followed by a request of her contact. Almost immediately Thunberg snapped back with a defensive reply stating, 'please do enlighten me at Small****energy@Getalife.' Initially, Tate, angered by this uncommonly confident approach to his reputation, replied with a measly 'How dare you!' However, knowing that this was an unusually tame method of silencing an argument considering his previous record of language, pursued to cause future debate by releasing a clip of himself with some Romanian pizza boxes and why he wouldn't responsibly dispose of them, knowing that this would cut deep for Greta. Having



spent the majority of her life fending for the planet, Thunberg took this much too kindly, but not long after, it was released that Tate had been arrested and she resorted in allowing the humiliation to speak for itself.

Thunberg's comment received over 12 million 'Likes' in just 72 hours and is claimed to be the 7th most viewed on Twitter.

100 Years of the BBC

This year the BBC is celebrating one hundred years since its founding. The British Broadcasting Corporation has been entertaining us Brits since 1922 and has produced some timeless classics like Eastenders, Mastermind and Doctor Who. The BBC has also spread out into other disciplines like Radio and Online news and has made the careers of so many actors, presenters, and celebrities.

On the Eighteenth October 1922 the BBC was formed when some of the biggest wireless companies at the time came together and began to broadcast as a group, but unbeknownst to them it would become the biggest broadcaster in Britain. Daily broadcasting began in Macaroni's London studio on the fourteenth of November and by the end of 1922 John Reith, a 33-year-old man had been appointed general manager of the BBC.

After the closure of several amateur radio stations the BBC

started its own radio station and began daily broadcasts and after much debate their news was supplied by an agency, and music and drama talks filled the empty slots.

Problems in the BBC

Nowadays the BBC is known for its captive dramas and entertaining game shows, but behind the scenes there is more controversy than you think. Recently the BBC has been accused of being racist, homophobic, transphobic, and biased. Back in 2009 journalist, Christopher Brooker, criticized the BBC for its coverage of India related matters.



Brooker said "the BBCs efforts to reinforce its South-African stereotypes has damaged the picture of Indians and encouraged racist behavior against Indians." Another instance of homophobia came when Leeds researchers investigated BBCs representation of the LGBTQ+ community. The researchers found that out of 168 hours (about 1 week) of view time only, 38 minutes (0.4%) represented gay and lesbian individuals, and 32 minutes of that was in a negative manner. The Independent accused the BBC of being the worst broadcaster in terms of portraying the LGBTQ+ community.





Children In Need

Children in need is a registered charity that helps raise money for children and young adults who struggle with a mental or physical illness. Each year in November the BBC hosts a grand Children in need spectacular where they show how some people are struggling, have special guests visit and raise money for a noble cause.

In conclusion the BBC will be known as one of the most successful and highest-quality broadcasting stations in Brittan and will be around for years, but they need to clean up their image if they want to stay on top.

Elon Musk's Twitter

What has happened to the once number 1. social media platform?

Since Twitter was founded in March 2006, to this day over 206 million people open the app daily, including many A-list celebrities. It used to be a safe, fun space for people to easily communicate and re-connect with friends and family, all while being able to share any opinions crossing your mind at the drop of the hat.

As years have passed however, Twitter has had a significant and infamous downfall towards being the laughingstock of media platforms.

When Jack Dursey founded Twitter in 2006, it was an instant smash hit. In 2006, social media was still a generally new idea, so when Twitter launched as a new and easily applicable way to talk to people and make new friends online, everybody loved the idea. Soon though, many politicians and presidents alike saw Twitter as a straightforward way to post their judgements. Donald Trump's presidency, for example, was so notorious mainly because of the

things he posted on a whim on Twitter. For example,

"26,000 unreported sexual assault charges in the military-only 238 convictions. What did these geniuses expect when they put men and women together?"

Due to these (frankly useless) tweets, Trump's Twitter was permanently revoked up until just last week when his ban was lifted.

This was the beginning of Twitter becoming a gallery for politicians' intense arguments that belong in an actual house of parliament, not on a laptop.

In late October of this year, Elon

Musk (a.k.a the creator of the electronic Tesla car, and the billionaire who could solve world poverty with a click of his fingers...and doesn't) bought Twitter for an astonishing <u>44</u>
<u>BILLION</u> dollars and became its official owner.

Even though Elon Musk is infamously known for being one of the world's most selfish billionaires, even *he* had to borrow money to own the site. 12.7 billion dollars, to be exact. Musk saw this as an opportunity to introduce the new subscription of 'Twitter Blue', which allows anyone who pays eight dollars a month to acquire the blue tick.

When Twitter Blue was first initiated however, since anyone, anywhere, at any time could buy the tick and put it next to their name (due to the lack of important verification processes), many saw this as the chance to pull a few tricks on Musk and his new addition to Twitter.

This even included many posing as Elon Musk himself on Twitter after purchasing the subscription!



The scheme was shut down soon afterwards, but not before Musk has let go over 50% of Twitters staff, with 1,200 resigning. This also ensued many celebrities to rid themselves of the website, including Mark Ruffalo;

"As Twitter grows more unpredictable & harmful to marginalized groups. I'm exploring some other avenues for us to connect, I'm excited to continue to foster and be in our great community, if you'd like to come alone for the ride, here's where to find me *inserted link*."

His adaptations and work-ethic so far are costing Twitter around <u>4</u> million dollars per day.

Many may question whether Elon Musks ownership is simply his way of pulling an over exploitative "power-move", his way of communicating "Look at me, I have the ability to do this, and you don't." or if he was simply just in over his head. Either way, Twitter

has transformed from a trustworthy, creative site, to one where we seriously had to question which one of Elon Musk's Twitter accounts is actually him.


The Incredible City of <u>Dubai</u>

insignificant fishing village it once was into the phenomenal place it is right now?


The DWTC was the first of its kind in the United Arab Emirates and inspired Cities like Abu Dabi and Sharjah onto creating incredible superstructures from the 828-meter Burj Khalifa to the 190-meter Abbco Tower, both containing that uniquely futuristic aspect, exclusive to the UAE, but as it shows, height isn't everything. After forming in 2003, the Dubai 'World islands' have become such a global statement about the amount of money the city has to play with, that they have made the

Dubai's Incredible Statistics aren't. just good for the Guinness book of world records though, around 67% of the United Arab Emirates 9.9 million people have the cash to own luxury cars and due to its independent airline and metro system, Dubai is rapidly increasing in population. 

The Mystery of Elon Musk's Money-Making Strategy

Today in our modern, sophisticated world, entrepreneurs are finding more methods for improving and developing their businesses to increase income and grow their company every day. Mass manufacturing products and selling them for a high profit is a way of living for millions of people across the globe. Last year in the United States alone, 12.3% of the population claimed they owned a business, making and protecting the profits for themselves. It is a constant debate in civilization of who owns the most money. In terms of entrepreneurs, Bill Gates, Elon Musk, and Jeff Bezos are at the very top of their field. Gates manages Microsoft (An immensely popular technology company, the creator of Windows OS and the Xbox console) and Bezos owns Amazon, the largest and most successful company worldwide, which is extremely popular due to its accessibility and capability to find almost any item on the planet for an affordable price.



There is no question that these are brilliant and effective ways of raking in the money but how does Musk manage to compete with these giants among businessmen?

In a straightforward way, Musk invests in ideas and companies he has a passion for. He is a qualified engineer with a degree in physics and economics from the University of Pennsylvania. He has shares in and owns multiple companies such as PayPal, Tesla, Twitter and SpaceX, all of which contain a certain futuristic promise about them.

We start with Tesla, which initially started making electric cars back in 2003 when it was founded and has grown to create outstandingly brilliant technology, from smartphones and batteries to folding houses

ever since it originated.

Tesla makes a considerable chunk of its profit from people called 'shareholders' - this means people have invested money into the success of Tesla so that when it flourishes the public who hold shares will collect a small sum of the profits depending on how well Tesla have done in that chosen time period. The company has proved so successful over recent years, it is now worth an estimated value of \$569 billion, (an astonishing 479 billion British pounds) though Musk only owns 24% of this despite his vast contributions.

Moving forward to PayPal, we discover some of the many advantages Musk experiences whilst operating this mature and respected app. PayPal is simply a computer program created to perform a secure method of contactless payment in public places or during online shopping. Every successful purchase made using PayPal has a miniscule amount of money extracted from it and transferred to Musk. Although it seems like this is a fair price to pay for the protection and confidence felt when paying with PayPal. Even if this is only mere nanniag with thougands of



customers using it for all their payments, the pittance really does add up. The only real disadvantage to this intelligent system is that with so many people using it the app has demand to be constantly updated and altered.

Twitter is Musk's most recent investment and has cost him upwards of 40 billion US dollars to add to his extensive list of assets. Musk plans to convert this previously popular communicating platform into a place where people can shop for goods and be offered money market accounts. Though this is hardly ground-breaking

technology, Musk did end up investing and borrowing shocking amounts of money for this recent project, so he certainly planted some serious trust into the outcome and profits of this new venture.

Finally, SpaceX, introduced in 2002, is a revolutionary company that is taking over the market of space technology through its manufacturing and launching of some of the most advanced rockets and spacecraft known to date. SpaceX charges both governmental and commercial customers to transport goods out of the planet's atmosphere and on to new destinations. These goods not only include ISS (International Space Station) supplies and infrastructure, but also people and satellites for purposes unknown to the public. Launching and creating space equipment is no easy task, from setting up the production chain and finding the market, this is an extremely impressive enterprise Musk is running.

Elon Musk may appear supremely rich but contrary to popular belief he rarely has large amounts of money to throw around. His Net value (All his companies combined) totals to more than £190

billion, but this is not his money to spend unless he trades his businesses away. This is a significant difference between Musk and his competitors. Despite this, Musk remains a truly impressive man, contributing to many good causes and wisely investing into the future of his companies instead spending his money on material goods. Over the past years, Musk has grown to prove he could be the best, most intelligent and most forwardthinking entrepreneur out there right now.

Lego-The Toy That Never Dies

Back in 1932, on August 10th a man by the name of Ole Kirk Kristiansen Founded a small toy company called Automatic Binding Bricks, which were developed from the spirit of old wooden bricks. They could be stacked up together and create many different things. Little did Ole Kirk know; his simple invention would become the most popular toy of many generations.

Almost one hundred years after it was first founded Lego has made over nineteen thousand sets consisting of over 400 billion pieces. If you shared them out to everyone in the world, each person

would have over eighty pieces! Or, if you were to stack them all up, it would reach the moon. Ten times. Lego has lot of themes in their sets, some of the current ones are; Lego Star Wars, Lego Speed Champions, Lego Technic, Lego Harry Potter, and Lego City. Some themes are from movies like the Star Wars sets. Many Huge projects have been made with Lego like a life-size Star Wars X-wing, made from over 5.3 million pieces and included a full interior and took 32 'master builders' almost three years to build. The Build was 42 times as big as the one that is




Lego world record tower bridge holding two land rovers weighing over 2 tons

available in the stores. Another huge build was a Lego tower bridge, which holds the world record for the largest sculpture made from Lego. It was 13 meters high and made from over 5.8 million bricks. The build held up not one, but two land rovers weighing 2 tons each. The show presenting it had Bear Grills abseil down the tower and then a Land Rover was driven through 90cm (about 2.95 ft) deep water under the open bridge.

Lego is a toy for all ages, with some people spending thousands of pounds on them each year, and its popularity is only increasing, so more sets will be made.

And soon it will be its hundredth birthday, so ready the birthday celebrations.

November Student PollScottish Independence





The Remarkable Life of David Attenborough





"My name is Jaccob."


"My name is Matthew."
