New School Update

East Dunbartonshire Council launched the statutory consultation for the new Lenzie Academy on Tuesday 7 May. The closing date for the consultation will be Wednesday 19 June. Details of how all stakeholders can participate in the consultation and send written feedback will be issued in mid- May. The school will also have special assemblies for our pupils and they will be involved in the consultation process itself, as will young people and their families from our associated primary schools. On Tuesday 11 June there will be a drop in session from 3.30pm until 7.00pm in the school assembly hall where plans can be viewed.

Staffing update

We have appointed a number of new staff in recent weeks:

1. **Mathematics:** Ms Ness, who has been Acting PT Mathematics for a year, was successful and now takes the job on a permanent basis.
2. **Health Food Technology:** Ms Walls has been appointed to the post of PT Health Food Technology to replace Mrs Fairman who will leave us in late May to become head of department in Paisley Grammar School.
3. **Music:** Ms Donaldson, who has been working with us on a temporary basis this year was successful at interview and is now a permanent member of staff.
4. **Health Food Technology:** Ms Walker will join us in August from St Roch's in Glasgow as a replacement for Ms Heron who left for a post nearer to home in West Dunbartonshire.
5. **Business Education:** Mr Friel, who was an NQT with us four years ago, re-joins the school in August as a permanent member of staff from Park Mains High School, Renfrewshire and replaces Ms Canning who left last year.
6. **Design Technology:** Mr Reid, our current NQT in Design Technology, joins us on a permanent basis in August.
7. **Chemistry:** Dr Sood, who is a permanent 0.6 FTE with us now will join us a 1.0 FTE to cover Ms McComb's maternity leave from August.
8. **Modern Languages:** Ms Verrane –Faichney will join us in August from Calderglen High School, South Lanarkshire and replaces Mrs Hall who left for a position nearer home in Inverclyde Council.

Mrs Buchanan, PT Guidance, left us in April to work in Graeme High School in Falkirk. We will be interviewing for her replacement in due course.

There are also a number of other posts still to be appointed before the end of June to ensure that we have a full staffing compliment for the new session.

School uniform


In previous newsletters I have outlined our concerns regarding a deterioration in the standard of school uniform by a minority of young people. Whilst the majority of pupils are proudly wearing their uniform, a small but increasing number of pupils are not wearing appropriate school uniform. This is becoming an increasing concern. We intend to engage with stakeholders regarding school uniform next session after discussing with our Parent Council.

In the meantime, we will be conducting regular uniform checks and will send a brief email to you as parents/carers where young people are not appropriate dressed to make you aware of it. There is no need to contact the school regarding this it is just a courtesy to make you aware and to allow you to engage with your child to ensure they are wearing appropriate school uniform. If there is no improvement thereafter, your child's year guidance teacher or year head will contact you to discuss the situation further.

I would like to thank you in advance for your cooperation in this matter.


Girls U18 Caledonia cup


Junior White Water Racing Scottish Champaign K1

On 22nd April, they embarked on a challenging and rewarding residential trip to the Columba 1400 Centre on the Isle of Skye.


They delved deeper into their own personal values by exploring them with the help of Columba 1400's core values (Awareness, Focus, Creativity, Integrity, Perseverance, and Service). Through a variety of activities, such as **Search and Rescue** and **Find Your Greatness** - They were encouraged to step outside their comfort zones, share their voices, and reflect on their values.

We've seen incredible growth in these pupils since the program began. They've developed greater confidence, honed their leadership skills and styles, and gained a deeper understanding of self-efficacy.

We can't wait to see how they use these newfound skills to benefit our community in Phase 3 and beyond!

S3 Elective

From the 23rd of April until the 31st of May S3 will be focussing on the 6 subjects that they are taking forward into S4 and three subjects that they will not continue with. All pupils will take part in the Youth Philanthropy Initiative (YPI) for 3 periods per week which allows them to work on skills such as teamwork, research, communication, practical skills, and ICT. Pupils then have two elective courses to enjoy, this year we have provided even more choice with the addition of Barista, Sociology, Printmaking in Art, Criminology, Physics in the Movies and Media. This is a great opportunity for S3 to have an experience of some of the options available to them to study in the senior school. We have continued to offer the Duke of Edinburgh Elective class and 25 pupils are participating in this and can start working towards their accreditation just now.



S3 Chocolatarium Trip

On Tuesday 23 April we headed off to a micro chocolate factory called the Chocolatarium in Edinburgh. We were on the bus for just over an hour and then walked a short two minutes down to the chocolate factory where the staff politely welcomed us and explained what our visit would entail. We were split into two groups.

My group were first to design and make our own chocolate bar. We were asked to choose a template for our design, some of us chose the Scotland flag, others the unicorn template and many more. We were asked what our favourite chocolate bar was as well as which chocolate we would like to use, milk, dark or white chocolate for our own chocolate bars. We both chose milk chocolate to fill our templates and were told we could use any of the toppings on our table. Toppings included white chocolate flakes, gold sugar, smarties, chili flakes and so much more. After we finished making our chocolate, it was put in the fridge to fully form, and our guide took us through the process of how to make chocolate from the cacao beans to the finished bar.



After we made our chocolate, we swapped with the other group and went into the tasting room where we learned about the history and evolution of chocolate from colonial times to the modern 21st century. Miss Macdonald volunteered Daniel to help Fraser make a very old-style cold chocolate drink with chili flakes. We were all given a small tester to see and taste what chocolate people used to drink. Let's say it wasn't very nice.

Fraser also spoke to us about their biggest target market and asked us all to guess who it would be whether it was international tourists, UK wide or local people. It turns out post-covid it was UK wide, that's where most of their sales come from. He also asked us how they market themselves and most of us said social media or billboards. He told us it was a mix of social media and paid advertisements on Google to ensure they are seen by a big audience. Their tours are where they make the most profits.



We then spoke about the operations and running of the business, how they attract people to work for them, how they keep them loyal to the business and meet customer demands. We all discussed ways he could attract the best possible people to the business by offering free chocolate and good benefits. We ended the tasting room by finally trying different chocolates including some chocolate from centuries ago which wasn't the nicest to ruby chocolate which tasted like strawberry milk chocolate to their best seller, Mackies Salted Caramel which was everyone's favourite.



Finally, we moved into The Cacao Jungle where we got to see the fruit of the chocolate tree and learn all about the cacao farmers and how they grow this fruit with the beans inside. We also got to taste a range of chocolate with different cacao %'s and the 100% cacao from Belize was not our favourite, we all liked the milk chocolate



from Ecuador. Following the end of the tour, we were given our chocolate bars and headed back to school.

Volvo/Rokbak Visit

A group of S5/6 Engineering Science and Practical Metalworking pupils visited the Volvo/Rokbak manufacturing plant in Motherwell to learn about the design, manufacture and testing of their very impressive million pound trucks! Pupils were taken through the complex manufacturing processes, from raw materials to completed vehicles and all of the stringent quality control activities the company did to ensure their trucks were perfect for customers.

As well as the factory tour, pupils had the opportunity to take part in test drives around a purpose built test track. They also heard detailed presentations from current staff about many different careers and opportunities within the company, from machining, design and engineering to finance and sales.



PEF – Equity

Pupil Equity Funding Background

Pupil Equity Funding (PEF) is additional funding from the Scottish Government allocated directly to schools and targeted at closing the attainment gap. This funding aims to ensure that all young people have equal access to educational opportunities. Funding can be used at the discretion of the school to provide targeted support for young people within the Broad General Education (S1-S3) who are living in SIMD areas 1-4.

The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) is a tool the Scottish Government use to identify the geographical areas in Scotland where people are most likely to experience disadvantage across different aspects of their lives including income, employment, health, education, access to services, crime and housing. It is important to note that SIMD ranking is based on geographical postcode and thus identifies deprived areas, not people.

Lenzie Academy has used some of this additional funding to purchase uniform items, stationery/organisational materials and hygiene products. There is a QR code outside of the upper and lower offices in the school. Pupils can scan this code and it will that take them to a Microsoft

Form that they can complete if they require any of these materials. Alternatively, pupils can request this support directly from their Guidance Teacher. Materials will then be issued discreetly to pupils where appropriate. Whilst these materials are primarily there for S1-S3 pupils living in SIMD areas 1-4, we appreciate the current economic climate is challenging for many families. Your child should speak to their Guidance Teacher in the first instance if any additional supports are required and we will try to accommodate this where possible. Parents can also make contact with the Guidance teacher to discuss potential supports.

Applications for Free School Meals & School Clothing Grants

Applications for Free School Meals & School Clothing Grants for academic year 2023-24 remain open. You can submit an application at any time throughout the academic year if your circumstances change. East Dunbartonshire Council has been allocated additional monies from the Scottish Government which means they have been able to double the School Clothing Grant to £300 per eligible secondary school child. This increase is aimed at helping families cope with the current cost of living increase and will be applicable only for the current academic year. Those in receipt of Free School Meals will also receive additional financial support during five holiday periods over the coming academic year – October mid-term 2023, Christmas 2023, February mid-term 2024, Easter 2024 and Summer 2024.

Please note that you must submit a new application for Free School Meals and/or School Clothing Grants each year.
