School roll

The school roll started at 1405 young people in August. This is the largest roll in more than 20 years so the school is extremely busy. The number of placing requests has dropped quite significantly in recent years due to a combination of housebuilding within the catchment area and the incorporation of Lennoxtown Primary School as an associated primary school for Lenzie Academy. The number of placing requests is now about 16% of \$1, down from more than 30% in previous years.

Due to a number of our senior pupils offered places at university through clearing; college places or securing full-time employment or training, the school roll now stands at 1371 with most year groups at capacity. There are a few spaces in S5 and S6 with all other year groups full.

New Staff

In May-June 2024, I was exceptionally busy filling a range of vacancies within the school to ensure that we opened in August with a full staffing compliment. I am delighted with the appointments made and I outline these below:

- **Depute Head Teacher Mr McClune**, formerly PT Design Technology & Computing Science, secured the permanent DHT vacancy having been Acting DHT for a year.
- **Principal Teacher of Art & Design** Mr McCallum, formerly Dunblane High School, joined us in August to take charge of our Art & Design department has made an immediate and positive impact upon the school and we welcome him to Lenzie Academy.
- **Principal Teacher of Guidance** Mrs Baxter, History Department, was appointed as a substantive PT Guidance, replacing Ms Buchanan, who left for a new position in Graeme High School, Falkirk. Mrs Baxter, who has worked in the school for a number of years, is a very welcome and valuable addition to our guidance team. She will take over responsibility for all IG2 classes.
- Acting Principal Teacher of Guidance Ms Shearer, PE Department, was appointed as an Acting PT Guidance and will take over all MK2 classes whilst Ms Carr is on maternity leave. Again, Ms Shearer is a very experienced teacher within the school and has served as an Acting PT Guidance before and will provide an excellent service to all the young people in MK2 classes, and to their parents & carers.
- **PT Health Food Technology** Following on from Mrs Fairman, who left for a post nearer to home, I am delighted to announce that Ms Walls was appointed to the permanent post of PT HFT. **Ms Walls** has worked in the school for a number of years now and the department is in very safe hands.
- Acting Principal Teacher of Physics Mr Tacey, who has been PT Physics within the school for many
 years, has decided to move onto phased retirement but will remain PT Physics for two days per week.
 When he is not in school I'm delighted to announce that Ms Warnock, who teaches in the department,
 was successful at interview and will assume Acting PT Physics responsibilities for three days per week.

Permanent teaching appointments:

- 1. **Business Education Mr Friel**, who was an NQT with us four years ago, has re-joined the school from Park Mains High School. We warmly welcome Mr Friel back to the school.
- 2. **Design Technology Mr Reid** joins the school permanently having had a very successful NQT year with us last year. Welcome back to Mr Reid.
- 3. **English Ms Lennox** joins us permanently from Inveralmond Community High School, West Lothian and brings a wealth of experience to the department. She is most welcome.
- 4. **Health Food Technology** we warmly welcome **Ms Law and Ms Watson** to the department to replace Ms Walls who is now PT and Ms Heron who left us last year for a position nearer home.
- 5. **History Mr Murray** joins the department permanently having impressed as an NQT last year and replaces Ms Byres, who left for a position nearer home in Edinburgh.
- 6. **Modern Languages Ms Varenne-Fachney**, who joins us from Calderglen High School, South Lanarkshire will work three days per week and replaces Mrs Hall, who left for a position in Inverclyde Council, having served the school well for many years. We thank Mrs Hall and welcome Ms Varenne-Faichney.
- 7. **Music** Having been an outstanding NQT in the school two years ago and taking on a temporary teacher position last year, I am delighted to welcome **Miss Donaldson** now as a permanent teacher of music within the school.
- 8. **Physics Mr Wadham** was my last appointment of the session on the day before the end of term in June. Mr Wadham is very welcome and joins the school from Park Mains High School, Renfrewshire.

SQA Results 2024

The 2024 SQA Results brought another exceptionally strong performance for our Senior Phase pupils. I will not go into the full details here but suffice to say that our young people have excelled in their exams and we are all very proud of this.

In S4 we had the highest number of 'A' passes in many, many years. For our S4, S5 and S6 cohorts we have measured up very strongly against other East Dunbartonshire schools for % A-C pass rates. Some examples from S4 are shown below:

When we are measured against all schools our departments were 1st or 2nd in 13 / 23 subjects across EDC. A very commendable performance and a real testament to the skill and commitment of our teachers and the dedication of our pupils. The situation with our S5 and S6 cohorts was also very strong but not as pronounced as that of our S4 cohort. For example, in S5 H Grade English we had an 88.1% pass rate against an EDC Average of 82.4%.

When measures against each individual schools in EDC our results stack up well in terms of %A-C pass rates so we have a lot to be proud of in the 2024 SQA examination results.

When our pupils results are measured against what the Scottish Government refers to as our 'Virtual Comparators' out pupils have done very well indeed. Some examples are shown below:

For information, a virtual comparator takes an average of 10 'other' pupils from different local authorities in Scotland (not EDC pupils) who share a similar socio-economic background to each of our pupils and compares their results with ours.

Over the breadth of our S4-6 performance of our pupils the school has, once again, demonstrated that we are delivering very well for our pupils in terms of the high quality of learning & teaching that takes place in the school daily across all departments leading to very strong performances in SQA examinations.

Lenzie Academy Celebration of Character Evening

In Lenzie Academy we don't focus exclusively on academic excellence, albeit this is an important aspect of school life. We have always valued the formation of wider character virtues as an important part of the education that we provide to our pupils. To this end, we offer a huge variety of extra-curricular activities and this can be evidenced towards the end of this newsletter. We also value the experiences young people receive from a wide array of school trips and excursions that we provide – some of which are cited in this newsletter and you will see more evidence of this in forthcoming newsletters. Allied to this we look to give our young people the positive benefits of opportunities that can be experienced through helping others and gaining credit for doing so.

On Wednesday 28 August we held our annual 'Celebration of Character' Evening. We have organised this event for a number of years now to celebrate the wider achievements of many of our pupils. Pupils are presented with a wide range of certificates to celebrate various non-academic achievements. The common denominator in all awards presented on the evening is that young people give of their own time to help others. This annual event is overseen by Mrs Davidson, our PT wider Achievement, but most of the work is done by the young people themselves. The event is coordinated by members of our L.A.C.E. Team (Lenzie Academy Community Engagement) who organise and run the event, including hosting the evening itself. This year we invited along James McEneny, the education correspondent of The Herald, as a guest to issue the certificates and he wrote a lovely piece about the evening for his newspaper, which I had previously issued this to all parents/carers.

The Education Scotland representative was hugely impressed by the contributions of all concerned and commended their honesty and their commitment to supporting a new school.

I have yet to hear further details regarding the progress of the new school since then but I will update all parents/carers via the newsletter as and when I am made aware of developments.

S6 Wellbeing Ambassadors

As part of Community Involvement, S6 students were invited to volunteer as Wellbeing Ambassadors, to deliver 3 Wellbeing lessons to S2 pupils, building their confidence to talk about Wellbeing and Mental Health and signposting them to the supports available in school and out.

Over the last month, as S6 Wellbeing Ambassadors, we have spent our time creating, planning, and directing lessons on the importance of mental health for the S2s. During these lessons we would introduce ideas to S2 students, developing their emotional literacy, giving them the tools to express and discuss their feelings.

Our training for this began back in June, when all the S6 who had volunteered to become Wellbeing Ambassadors gathered on the bridge. We spent the day discussing our own understanding and interpretation of mental health and the causes and effects of it, as well as working on some team-building activities.



The team building activities were an essential part of the process as it gave us the confidence to work as part of a team, sharing opinions and experiences. One activity we did was lining everyone up in order of their birthdays – oldest at the start of the line, youngest at the end – this exercise prioritised communication, a vital skill for teamwork. Another example was the "Cup-stack Challenge", stacking plastic cups to build a tower with each team member holding onto one piece of string attached to an elastic band, to guide the cups on top of each other. This proved to be as difficult, and as fun as it sounds! This activity again tested our team working skills as we had to work together to successfully stack the cups.



Then came time for the actual lessons. We were given access to basic power points which we then had to build upon by adding our own information and details. Once these were finished, we organised who would cover and present which slides, within our groups. Going into the lessons, one thing I (and many others) assumed we would struggle with, was presenting to the class itself, maintaining the attention of the class while being the sole person speaking. However, as nerve wracking as the entire ordeal sounded, I was quite surprised with how my confidence developed as the lessons went on. By the third and final lesson, all members of our group were able to direct the class with much more ease, me included.

Naturally, we expected that, like the training day entailed, leading these lessons would require effective communication skills working with our groups and delivering them to the S2 classes. However, to my surprise, the most important skill we honed over our lessons was the ability to improvise in the moment. Like many of the others I expected to solely rely on the power point for direction within the lesson, so it was almost comical how often things managed to go wrong despite our preparation.

There were small things, such as being unaware the class had not been provided with jotters for our starter task, which we quickly handled by giving out whiteboards instead. There were other incidents, such as entirely misinterpreting a task and having to invent a new one on the spot! But despite these hurdles, all of which were

resolved by quick thinking and effective communication from the people in our group, we managed to successfully deliver the three Wellbeing lessons.

These situations, to name a few, really put into perspective the careful planning it takes to not only prepare a lesson, but effectively run one too. Therefore, the ability to improvise when something doesn't go according to plan was something everyone unquestionably improved upon throughout their experience.

All in all, this was an incredible experience not only for all the skills and abilities we gained and improved upon throughout the last few weeks, but also for the



experience of being able to lead something as large as a lesson. It gave us an opportunity to develop the confidence and trust in ourselves to go on to do even bigger things in the future.

They acted as role models and guides to their student groups throughout the course, participating in activities with them and helping look after them around the house. The team represented the school very well, and only lost out on progressing to the next round in a tiebreaker question.



To give you some context of the school - it has about 130 pupils, those with no families live in and the rest come from the local villages. Most pupils have an hours walk to reach the school which is in the hills. The



school day starts at 6am, and finishes at 6pm. The pupils get meals at the school, breakfast is porridge and lunch and dinner is a rice dish. The school grows its own fruit and vegetables and has hens for eggs and chicken - the pupils look after all this!
