Welcome to the new session and I hope all parents/carers and pupils had a pleasant summer holiday. The term has started very well and our new S1 pupils have now familiarised themselves with the layout of the building and are finding their way around without much trouble. There is always a very positive buzz in the first few weeks of term as young people meet up with their friends and many form new friendships with people in new classes. It's very nice to see so many young people laughing and joking with friends at intervals and lunch and we are pleased that so many of our young people feel happy and safe within the school.

The content of this newsletter demonstrates that we as a school value the education of your children in the widest sense through exposure to various trips, extra-curricular activities and recognising young peoples' achievements in many diverse fields.

I would like to thank all parents/carers who completed the parental survey that was issued last term. The results of this survey are really positive and give our teachers and support staff a welcome boost that you, as key stakeholders, value the contributions that they make to your children when they attend the school. I will provide more comprehensive feedback to all parents/carers in the next school newsletter.

# SQA results

Over the past few years we have enhanced our attainment profile very effectively and I am pleased to say that our S4, S5 and S6 pupils once again achieved excellent SQA results. Our S4 pupils have maintained our three year rolling average of 72% achieving five or more National 5 qualifications, whilst in S5 we had more than 1/3 of the cohort achieving five Higher Grade qualifications whilst 53% achieved four or more Higher Grades and 2/3 of S5 pupils achieved three or more Higher Grades. Overall, nearly 90% of pupils achieved a Higher Grade qualification in S5 and this is to be commended. These results have led to more incremental improvements in our three year rolling average figures so we are all delighted with the continued progress made by our pupils. In S6 we had yet another increase in the number of our pupils achieving one or more Advanced Higher Grade qualifications – the fourth year of consecutive improvement with a record number of pupils achieving three Advanced Higher Grades. Well done to all of our young people.

# **Staffing Update**

We have had quite a few changes to staffing this year for a variety of reasons and I outline these below:

- Mrs McCracken, PT Guidance and teacher of Mathematics secured a Depute Head Teacher post in Glasgow. Mrs McClure (Biology) has taken up the Acting PT Guidance post.
- Mr Dunsmuir, PT Guidance and teacher of PE has moved to Douglas Academy to fill an Acting Depute Head Teacher post. Ms Shearer (PE) has taken up the Acting PT Guidance post.
- Mr Fraser, PT Computing, has retired and Mr McClune, PT Design Technology, will look after the Computing Department on an acting basis.

- Mrs Priester, PT Curriculum Support and teacher of Business Education has retired and Mrs Davidson (RE) has taken up the Acting PT Curriculum Support post.
- Our new probationer teachers have taken up post in various departments – Ms Campbell (English), Ms Edwards (Modern Languages), Ms Kielty (Chemistry), Mr Merton (Physics), Ms Sampaio (Art & Design), Mr Chainey (Modern Studies) and Ms McFadden (History)
- We have appointed Mr McGovern (English) and Mr Southcott (Biology) as Acting PTs of Raising Attainment.
- We welcome back Ms Carty, Principal Teacher of Religious and Moral Education, who returns to us after having a two year career break and Ms Baxter (History) who returns from maternity leave.
- Mr McCaffrey (Computing) has joined us as a part-time member of the Computing Department.
- We also have a number of temporary staff with us at the moment – Ms Dewar (Mathematics), Ms Ihsan (Biology) and Mr Brown (Business Education).
- We also welcome Ms O'Keefe and Ms Blair who join our office staff to ensure that we are back up to our full complement of support staff.

#### School refurbishments

We have had a number of improvements made to the school over the holiday period –

- 1. **Roofing** we are currently having a replacement roof put on the original building to ensure it is wind and watertight. This is unfortunately causing some short-term inconvenience at the moment for pupils and teachers due to the noise but hopefully this work will be completed shortly.
- Front doors we have had a new front doors installed which enables us to make this one of the main entrance and exit points to the school building. This saves the young people having to walk all the way around to the side entrance to gain access. This is a most welcome development.
- 3. **Biology base** after many years of having a working area that was not fit for purpose out Biology staff now have a new, much improved staff base and this is a welcome addition to the school.
- 4. **Technician's base** due to the creation of a new Biology base we have had to reconfigure our technicians' base. This has been upgraded and also is much improved from what was previously there.

We will be progressing with some more improvements over the coming year with each improvement enhancing the quality of provision for our pupils. We thank East Dunbartonshire Council for their continued investment in the school estate.

## Paris-Alps Trip – "an unforgettable week"

Thirty seven S1 and S2 pupils began the annual Paris-Alps trip with an overnight coach journey from Lenzie Academy to Dover on Friday 23rd June. Early the next morning we boarded a ferry named the Spirit of Kent and sailed across the English Channel to Calais. We continued our journey from there to Disneyland Paris where we spent the remainder of the day at Disneyland village.



During our time at the there we had the opportunity to go on a variety of rides, such as the Tower of Terror and the Rock 'n' Rollercoaster. After a tiring day we arrived at the B&B Hotel near Disneyland that was to be our bed for the night. The next morning we took a shuttle bus from the hotel to Disneyland and spent the whole day, from opening time to closing time, in the Magic Kingdom. In the morning we took the coach to the very picturesque old city of Annecy. We



spent the morning looking round the old town and its shops. After that we went swimming in Lake Annecy which was definitely a lot warmer than any of the lochs in Scotland! The next day we had another day out, this time to Chamonix where we were rewarded with spectacular views of glaciers and Mont Blanc. We were going to go to another adventure park but due to the weather, it rained constantly, we went to an indoor swimming pool instead. That night we took part in a quiz which was great fun as we tried to beat each other and win the prizes which were sweets bought in Disneyland.

All too soon it was our final day in France and we all took part in a treasure hunt based on clues around the village of Les Contamines-Montjoie. At about 8 o'clock that evening we said farewell to the Alps and set off on our twenty four hour journey back to Lenzie. After the long coach journey and the ferry we finally arrived back in Lenzie after an amazing week ready to begin our summer holidays.

FOLA is a group of parents and staff who work throughout the year to raise funds which allow the school to obtain additional resources that otherwise could not be budgeted for. Each of these purchases enhances the wider school life and experiences of pupils in a range of activities

Significant bids thus far have included new temporary staging used at concerts, shows and prize giving. 

## <u>The Curious Incident of the Dog in the</u> <u>Night Time</u>



Lenzie Academy's Higher Drama class recently went to see 'The Curious

Incident of the Dog in the Night Time' at the King's Theatre, Glasgow. The play is set in Swindon and is about a 15-year-old amateur detective named Christopher John Francis Boone who is a math genius. He appears to have an unspecified <u>autism</u> <u>spectrum</u> disorder, although the condition is never explicitly stated in the play. The curious incident is the mystery surrounding the death of a neighbour's dog found speared by a garden fork.

Everyone in the class really enjoyed the performance. They used lots of technology and projections to enhance the story and our favourite part was the live dog onstage!! In particular the lighting was really striking as they used a mix of LEDs and traditional theatrical lanterns. The production has definitely given us lots to write about in the final exam.



#### **Teenage Cancer Trust**

Adam Niven and Iain MacDonald, both new S3 pupils, have raised money by visiting 180 train stations in eight days. So far they have raised £410 through cash and online donations. All money will be donated between Teenage Cancer Trust and Lenzie Academy Malawi Fund. The boys were inspired to do their challenge when two Londoners visited all 2563 stations in the UK and felt this was a different way to raise money and chose to visit stations in the Glasgow and Strathclyde area.



A visitor from Teenage Cancer Trust came to the school to raise awareness and to tell pupils about the new facilities at the Queen **Elizabeth University Hospital and how it** provides care for young people with cancer aged 13 to 16 across the West of Scotland.
