Dine with President Obama Competition



In May of this year The Hunter Foundation offered Scottish school pupils the opportunity to 'Dine with President Obama' when he visited Edinburgh. The brief was to write a piece

entitled, "If I ruled Scotland...what would I change, and why?" The prize was a table for 10 at the dinner held in the President's honour.

The Hunter Foundation was so impressed with the standard of entries written by Scotland's talented young people that they collated the entries into an e-book. Several Lenzie Academy pupils submitted entries and Sean Thornton (2MR) has had his submission included in this book. Here is his entry:

"Scotland is an ever progressing nation known for creativity and the fabulous warmth of its people. As with all countries, a strong and stable economy is key and tourism is one of Scotland's most important assets. In terms of industry Scotland is always evolving. Key business sectors include life sciences, electronic technologies, energy and financial services. Ultimately though people make Scotland the place that it is. In employment, we are well-educated, skilled and motivated – and we are proud of inventiveness and innovation. While Scotland is a small nation it has big ambitions.

Therefore, if I was in the fortunate position to lead Scotland, I would wish to expand on these ambitions and focus on making Scotland a self-sufficient country in energy. Scotland is more than capable in supporting itself in terms of energy having previously achieved targets, for example in 2015 when Scotland generated 59% of its electricity usage through renewable sources, reaching the country's hefty goal of 50% renewable energy by 2015. In 2008, the Scottish Island of Eigg became the first in the world to become totally self-reliant through the use of wind, water and solar electric systems and I see no reason why this can't be the case for the whole of Scotland. As is always the case when an eager ambition is considered, one drawback is determining just how such an initiative will be funded. The easiest and fairest way would be through a basic taxation scheme on electricity. If every person/business in Scotland -

all paid a small amount towards the scheme when paying their electricity bills then the target of making Scotland self-sufficient in energy would become easily achievable. For example for an average person paying £25 a week – this would increase to around £26/27 and then when the target has then been reached and there are enough renewable sources in place, this will then aid the public in reducing the cost of electricity bills with a bill much lower but still consisting of a small tax which will be put towards the maintenance of these renewable sources.

If successfully achieved then the initiative would then gradually begin to pay for itself and bring numerous benefits to the country and population. For example, the increase in wind, wave and solar sources of energy must be produced if Scotland is to reach its target and hence so too will employment be increased as labour must be carried out to produce and maintain these resources. At the moment there are over 58,000 jobs in the low carbon and renewable energy economy in Scotland - a number which over time would only grow. Furthermore as energy is a scientific field it will also offer the chance for both the younger and older generations to learn new skills in the production and maintenance of this initiative – which of course could be reused in other professions. A boost in employment will result in a boost in the economy, with more people benefiting from a more flexible income. The public will be spending more and the country will see both businesses and people using even more energy than before however now the prices are considerably reduced as there is no need for high prices as expensive non-renewable fossil fuels such as crude oil, coal and gas are not necessary. The methods of energy production currently in place with the exploitation of fossil fuels such as crude oil, coal and gas, all carry numerous disadvantages, unlike renewable energy sources. For example, fossil fuels are non-renewable energy resources. Their supply is limited and they will eventually run out. Fossil fuels do not renew themselves, whereas wind, solar and tidal power can be renewed endlessly. Furthermore, fossil fuels release carbon dioxide when they burn, which adds to the greenhouse effect and increases global warming. As wind, solar and tide energy are all natural sources of energy this is not the case for renewable energy sources. This means that if Scotland did become self-sufficient the country would be extremely ecological and would considerably

benefit the environment.

decrease in price of energy bills to many households. Also the small tax that was previously implemented would still be in place – although even smaller given that energy would be much cheaper.

Therefore my government would take advantage of the savings and available funds made here through the expansion of public sector organisations and social responsibilities. For example, money saved and put back into the economy could easily be diverted to funding the NHS to increase the number of doctors, nurses and staff as well as ground breaking new technology and drugs to treat patients. This can therefore help those in poverty who are suffering and can't afford the treatment they need.

In addition further social responsibilities can be addressed such as an ever growing population — giving that funds would already be supplied to the NHS for improved services more sheltered housing could be made available with new homes built suitable for renewable energy usage. Furthermore with ever evolving and improving technology the world now has the likes of electric cars and other transport systems which could potentially be put to use in everyday life.

These are just some of the advantageous possibilities that could come about from the introduction of renewable sources of energy – an initiative bound to act as a pull factor for people to come and visit Scotland and see it for the beautifully, progressive small but mighty country that it is.

If I won, I would include on my table those who I feel could most efficiently and effectively deal with such a task of making Scotland renewable – or in other words – members of my cabinet. The table would include those such as my older brother David as he takes a great interest and is very knowledgeable in regards to politics. I would also invite my older sister Megan as she is in fact employed by British Gas and therefore has experience in the energy sector, as well as some friends – who I believe could bring some interesting ideas and could further my ambition to make Scotland as self-sufficient as possible therefore maximising it's potential."

This Restless House

Last month the Higher Drama class went to see 'This Restless House' at The Citizen's Theatre. The story is based on the epic Greek trilogy 'The Oresteia' and is a contemporary take on an ancient drama that has survived two and a half thousand years. The story begins with a father's horrifying sacrifice of his daughter which sets in motion a cycle of bloody revenge and counter-revenge. As his family rots from the inside as a result of his brutal act, the loyalties of his surviving children are pushed to the extreme. The play lasted for over four hours with two intervals and was an immersive sensory experience from the start. The music in particular was very striking using open pianos and playing the strings to create distorted sound effects. The genre was horror/tragedy and all audience members were shocked and scared throughout the

performance. At each interval all pupils were discussing the performance and comparing interpretations and many pupils stated they would be keen to see it again.

Lessons from Auchwitz

They will attend a Seminar in Glasgow on 27th September to meet a survivor and then travel to Auchwitz on 3rd October for the day. Heather and Jenny will then complete a follow-up seminar where they discuss ideas to share what they have learned with younger year groups. Following this they will then deliver lessons to lower school pupils and possibly primary school pupils later in the year.

On Tuesday 5th September PC's Ross Blain and Chris Smith of Kirkintilloch police station visited Lenzie Academy to talk about a career with Police Scotland.

S4 Biology Trip to Edinburgh Zoo



On Tuesday 5th September, S4 Biology pupils visited Edinburgh Zoo. We were all very excited

about going as we wanted to see the animals, particularly the pandas, and learn more about the work of the Zoo.

The first thing we did when we arrived was visit the Education Centre where we were split into groups to walk around the zoo. We had an interesting talk about biodiversity and conservation whilst seeing some of the animals. We then headed back to the Education Centre where we took part in a fun quiz to test how much attention we'd been paying to the talks and what we could remember. One of the groups even managed to score more points than the teachers group, but only just!

Afterwards we visited the pandas which was very exciting as, for most of us, it was the first time we had seen them. They are called Tian Tian and Yang Guang, which translates to Sweetie and Sunshine in English. Only the male panda, Yang Guang was on display as the zoo was hoping that the female, Tian Tian, was pregnant. We asked our guide if Tian Tian was pregnant but she said she wasn't allowed to tell us, even if she knew. After visiting Sunshine, we were allowed to wonder around the zoo by ourselves to look at the other animals for a wee while. During this time, we got to see many different species including the big cats, zebras and meerkats. Then it was back to the penguin enclosure for the parade. Only a few of the penguins were in the mood to parade that day so it didn't last very long which was just as well as it started to rain heavily at that point.

Overall, the trip to Edinburgh Zoo was very informative whilst also being entertaining. We learnt a lot of interesting facts from our visit about the animals and had a lot of fun wandering around the park and visiting the many different species there.

A huge thank you to 'Friends of Lenzie Academy' for recently funding a new set of U16 football strips. The cost and




