Ms Swinson is very supportive of Modern Studies and helps bring the subject to life in a very meaningful way for our young people so we thank her for her ongoing commitment to our pupils. It is also worth noting that two of our pupils have been awarded the prestigious Diana Award for services to their wider community. Iona Smith (S5) for taking a lead role in the Rights Respecting Schools Award within Lenzie Academy and Emma Mahon (S6) for her role a part of the Sports Council for Scotland. Supporting our pupils

As you will be aware we support our pupils in a variety of ways, especially those pupils in the Senior Phase who have important SQA exams coming up later on in the session. Some of the supports we put in place are outlined below:

- LA Launch open to all pupils this programme operates on a Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 3.30 – 4.30. It allows pupils to work together on projects, research and complete homework tasks assigned to them. There is no requirement to sign up pupils just turn up to classroom B8.
- Counselling we operate a counselling service for young people who feel that they require some support to help them at various points in their schooling. This can be requested via our guidance staff.
- After school assessments for young people in S3-6 who miss assessments or need to re-sit assessments we offer this after school opportunity on Mondays and Tuesdays from 3.30-5.00. This ensures young people can complete assessments in controlled conditions and that they don't need to miss important class work.
- Supported study As a school we will be offering a much more comprehensive and wide-ranging supported study programme for our S4-6 pupils to help them enhance their skills to hopefully enable them to secure the best possible qualifications that they can achieve. Details have already been put on our website and pupil have been given details of what is on offer each night between now and the Christmas holidays. This is an

important support for our pupils and I would urge parents/carers to engage with their children to make the most of this opportunity.

 Mentoring – We will be assigning staff mentors to those young people in S5-6 who we feel, in light of the recent monitoring and tracking report, need some extra help and support. Letters will be issued to parents whose children will be involved in due course.

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

We thank Jo for giving of her time to come along to Lenzie Academy to answer our questions.


S1 Residential

Auschwitz visit



In September I was lucky enough to be chosen, along with Jenny Burr in my year by the history department, to

take part in the Lessons from Auschwitz Project where I got to listen to a Holocaust survivor and visit Auschwitz-Birkenau. The Holocaust Educational Trust which was established in 1988 works with schools, universities and in communities to provide an understanding of the Holocaust and raise awareness of its importance to younger generations.

We arrived at Auschwitz 1 with the infamous sign looming above - Arbeit Macht Frei meaning "work makes you free." The bitter irony being that less than 10% of people who walked through these gates survived. What really stood out for me was the mass of hair and shoes that was on display. There was so much of it yet it was only a fraction of what belonged to those who died and the thought of it made my throat tighten. Auschwitz-Birkenau was even more eerie to be at. As I walked in silence down the railway track the deafening sound of lost hopes, futures and dreams echoed all around. I suddenly lost the urge to complain about the bad weather or how wet my feet were. I was numb, I couldn't feel anything. Everything was unbelievably surreal to say the least.

It is hard to comprehend the suffering and mass extermination that occurred. Six million Jewish people died. But this is not just a number; this is six million individuals whose families lost mothers, daughters, fathers and sons. Six million people who were just like you and me but were tortured, abused and ultimately killed for their religion. Putting it into perspective, the whole of Scotland would have been wiped out. However it is easy to forget that the perpetrators were individual human beings too. They had their own lives and families who they loved. Many of the collaborators such as the Women's Auxiliary Unit joined not to kill Jews, but for the ability to travel countries and even find a husband. But I think this makes it all the more frightening. We have the capacity to be both good and evil. We can switch of our emotions and perform horrendous acts against people, without blinking an eye, and return home like nothing ever happened.

The philosopher George Santayana said "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." And unfortunately, we do not learn from history. Anti-Semitic attacks hit record high in the UK, with 767 incidents in the first six months of 2017. The Holocaust teaches us that if we stay silent and allow people to carry out these acts, it only encourages problems to grow stronger and escalate into something much worse. If we are ignorant to the world around us, evil will always triumph.

After our visit we attended a follow-up seminar where we discussed our feelings about the trip and our next steps. As part of the course, we are expected to teach others what we learned through this experience to ensure the true horrors of the Holocaust are never forgotten or repeated. To spread our message, we will deliver a presentation in front of our school on Holocaust Memorial Day as well as prepare an interactive class with another school in the local area.

European School Sports Day

European School Sports Day (ESSD) is a Pan-European initiative of which, Scotland officially took part in for the first time this year. Lenzie Academy being one of the first schools to officially register with the event in Scotland, joined 23 countries around the continent, involving thousands of schools and a staggering 1.5 million young people being active in a wide array of physical activity and sport.

ESSD is a school day dedicated to having fun, playing together and promoting physical activity and health for everyone. It is a celebration which provides the opportunity for schools to

- Connect with other European Countries
- Raise the profile of physical education (PE) and school sport (...right at the start of the school year)
- Create fun and enjoyment through physical activity initiatives for young people
- Promote health and wellbeing for lifelong learning
- Foster social inclusion and develop social competences among whole school/cluster communities.

Lenzie Academy S1 pupils took part in a full day of sport. Throughout the day there was football, gymnastics, benchball, tug of war, badminton, table tennis, netball. The day was finalised with a huge running relay for all S1 pupils for a full period.



The PE department used the ESSD to launch the school interhouse programme, where pupils compete against each other representing their associated school house team. The winners on the day were Fleming House gaining 200 house points, 2nd place was MacKintosh gaining 100 house points and joint 3rd place to Inglis and McKay House each being awarded 50 points.



AH Biology trip to Arran

12 pupils, with Mrs McClure and Miss Steel set off for Lochranza in Arran in the school minibus. After a smooth sailing and a long drive, we arrived at the Field Centre where we were greeted by the owner, Chris. We changed into our waterproofs and headed to the classroom to learn about some of the plants and animals we would find on the seashore before taking the minibus to the beach. Another trip to the beach saw a group of seals observing us from nearby rocks while we measured limpets on the shore. It was a long, cold afternoon and afterwards we walked back to the centre past some bellowing stags and tried to find a badger sett. We were all very tired that night, but it didn't stop us playing darts and pool in the games room. On our final morning, we were back in the classroom preparing for our final study looking at succession in a hydrosere before heading outdoors again. Once we were all cleared up, it was back to the minibus (and Miss Steel's singing!) to get the ferry home. We were all very tired, but had lots of fun together finding out about sampling ecology.

Spooky Sevens



The interhouse touch rugby tournament, better known as spooky sevens returned for its second year in a row. The tournament runs during lunch times and pits each house against each other in a fast based display of skill and teamwork. Teams try to score tries against one another by running past the defence to score. The defending team tries to make a two handed touch to stop them. When touched they place the ball back between their legs for a teammate to pick up. Players can pass in open play, every pass must go back towards that team's line. These rules proved a little complicated for some of the younger new comers but it was all played in good spirits.

S1 started the competition with a very strong showing from Mackintosh house allowing them to pull away in to first place on day 1 and hold that position for their three day period. Many non rugby players competed against them and made them work hard to secure their position. S1 is the age group which has the most engagement with non rugby players and as such builds the schools S1 team the most. S2 followed with a much more structured game of rugby. McKay were the top dogs here; showing tremendous teamwork and skill to score more tries than every other house. It was Inglis time to shine when S3 took the field. Despite Mackintosh pulling in close to 20 players; Inglis were too much to overcome as they still won with
