Welcome to our December newsletter.

By the time you receive this newsletter the school will be back in full swing. I hope you

had a pleasant and relaxing Winter break. Our Senior Phase pupils in S4-6 are currently be engaged in their preliminary examinations which, thus far, have been mercifully free from disruption due to adverse weather. I hope our pupils do as well as they hope for in these exams but, as I made clear in the last newsletter, whilst we are very happy with the progress on our pupils after the October assessment block there can be a dip in performance at prelim time and this is a trend across most schools in the country, for a whole variety of reasons. I am currently meeting with the departmental heads to discuss post-prelim intervention strategies to aid those youngsters who may be struggling in one or more subject areas. As parents/carers of young people in S4, S5 or S6 what I would say to you is do not be overly concerned should your child not achieve as highly as they thought they might in the preliminary examinations. Our curricular structure ensures that we finish the N5 and H Grade courses in good time to facilitate a very comprehensive consolidation and revision programme where the key skills required for success in the SQA examinations are developed and enhanced. It is for this reason that over the last two years the quality of passes has been exceptionally high and we anticipate a continuation of this trend later in the year when the SQA results are released. We will continue to offer supported study sessions across the February/March period and we will probably run classes in the first week of the Spring break. Details will follow about these programmes in due course.

Christmas Events

The annual Christmas Concert was a splendid success and there was certainly a 1980s feel to a lot of the pieces that were played e.g. the theme from 'Rocky', Lypsync's 'Funky Town' and much more besides as well as the standard and expected Christmas music. Since the 1980s is my era of music I perhaps enjoyed the evening more than most. Our Christmas Dances were very well attended and although we had to move the venue, due to the problems with our assembly hall floor, this did not detract from the enjoyment of the events for our pupils whose behaviour was exemplary. The S1 Panto 'Aladdin' was a great night for our S1 pupils. The only negative in the Christmas events programme was the fact that we had to cancel the 'Santa dash' due to inclement weather

Christmas Concert


A big well done and thank you to all who participated in our

Trip to New College Lanarkshire in Cumbernauld

Moreover, it was highlighted to the pupils the many different pathways to reach their long term goals, whether that be apprenticeships, college or university.
